"You have indeed!" agreed the lion.

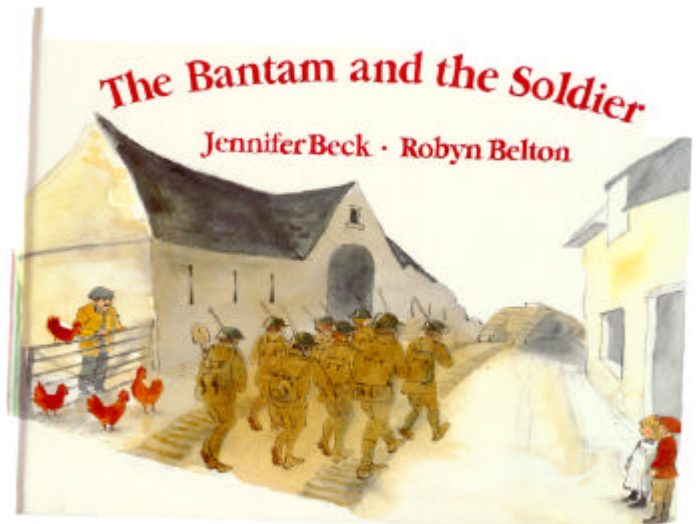

A Book For Sharing With The Whole Family

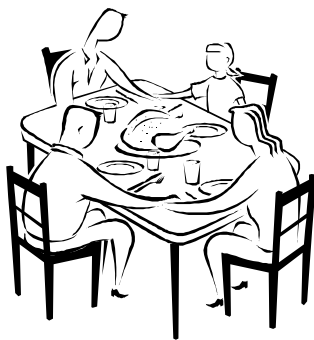
The Bantam and the Soldier by best-selling author Jennifer Beck and prize-winning illustrator Robyn Belton is a story about kindness and friendship.
